Partnerships

Bi-National Education Week with Mexican Consulate

The Riverside County Library System (RCLS) Literacy Services was invited to collaborate with the San Bernardino Mexican Consulate, which serves both San Bernardino and Riverside counties, for its Bi-National Education Week celebration in August. On August 22, 2024, Leticia and her team held a Facebook Live session to highlight the variety of resources and educational opportunities available at RCLS libraries, including mobile services such as ESL and family literacy resources.

The Literacy Services team also visited the Mexican Consulate twice during the week and held several informational sessions throughout the day, with attendance reaching a minimum of 30 people per session. During each session, they assisted participants with signing up for library cards and registering for family literacy programs.

REFORMA

REFORMA, an affiliate of the American Library Association, is dedicated to promoting library and information services for Latinos and Spanish-speaking communities. The Riverside County Library System (RCLS) collaborates with the REFORMA Inland Empire (IE) Chapter to provide professional development opportunities for RCLS staff through programming, events, and outreach initiatives aimed at Spanish-speaking communities across Riverside County.

Through this partnership, REFORMA IE has achieved significant milestones in 2023-2024. The organization has donated Spanish-language books to the Children in Crisis initiative, addressing the literacy needs of asylum-seeking children. Additionally, the partnership has supported local cultural arts by hosting events that feature Latine musical performances and zine workshops, fostering the storytelling and cultural expression of the local Latine community.

REFORMA IE remains committed to its collaboration with RCLS, striving to expand its initiatives and continue supporting Spanish-speaking communities throughout Riverside County.

Riverside County Office of Economic Development

RCLS continues to benefit from strong leadership from the Riverside County Board of Supervisors and the Riverside County Office of Economic Development.

In June, representatives attended to support the Louis Robidoux Library's Summer Reading Program kick-off event. The event featured a live broadcast from 93.5 KDAY-FM and appearances by Elephant & Piggie! International dance demonstrations were performed by Miss Theresa Smith, and crafts, activities, and incentives were distributed by community partners, including the Inland Empire Water Keepers, Healthy Jurupa Valley Reach Out, the Rubidoux Youth Center, and the Inland Empire Resource Conservation District.

These partnerships bring valuable resources and programming to our community, and we would like to express our gratitude for their continued support.

Services and Innovation



Fiero Code

The launch of our new e-learning platform, Fiero Code, has been a remarkable success across RCLS libraries, empowering users to develop essential coding skills in a fun and engaging way. Fiero Code is tailored to accommodate a wide range of skill levels, from complete beginners to more experienced coders, making it accessible for everyone in our community.



The Palace Project

The Palace Project is an e-reading experience developed by and for libraries. With the Palace app patrons have access to more of the library's ebooks and audiobooks in one place The app contains thousands of free books from the Palace Bookshelf as well as titles our library has purchased through the Palace Marketplace.

Hydroponics at the La Quinta Library

The City of La Quinta purchased a Flex Farm Hydroponics System to be utilized by the La Quinta Public Library, becoming the 3rd library in the U.S. to offer this innovative setup. This 5-foot-tall, 3-foot-wide vertical system produces 20-25 pounds of produce every 30 days using 98% less water than traditional farming. Patrons can grow, monitor, and harvest produce year-round, with the potential to yield up to 400 pounds annually. The library plans to establish a Farmer's Market and donate excess produce to local food banks and school culinary programs.



Multicultural Connection

Russian Story Hour

The Home Gardens Library's Russian Story Hour offers new immigrants the opportunity to connect with the existing Russian-speaking community through traditional stories, games, and arts and crafts led by Russian-speaking volunteers and library staff.

With the ongoing conflict between Russia and Ukraine, the program's initial focus has been to provide a welcoming and inclusive space for Russian-speaking families. The challenge of serving both Russian and Ukrainian communities simultaneously was the language barrier, which prevented participants from fully utilizing existing library services. To address this issue and meet the community's needs, we initiated a search for Russian-speaking patrons and community members interested in assisting with programming. Russian-speaking volunteers have helped library staff create inclusive programming by featuring a Ukrainian folktale in a children's theater play, selecting crafts and games for families, donating books by Russian and Ukrainian authors, and locating support resources for adults. As a result, the Story Hour program has become a crucial initial point of contact for families who are often newly arrived in the country.

This well-received program is growing, and positive feedback from attendees has been collected through interviews and surveys. One patron wrote, "We came to the library within the first week we arrived in the U.S. We did not know anybody and did not understand how things work. The library instantly provided us with a place to meet other Russian-speaking families, offered ESL classes, and activities for kids. You are doing an amazing job." The program continues to experience a steady increase in attendance, reaching as many as 60 participants during each Story Hour. Russian Story Hour has also gained recognition from the California Library Association's CLAtalk Monday Mentions: "Home Gardens Library in Riverside County hosts innovative programs to serve immigrant families!" Our goal is to further enhance meaningful library programming through broader collaborations that build and strengthen connections throughout the community.







Community

Lunch at the Library

The Riverside County Library System was proud to participate in California State Library's Lunch at the Library, a grant opportunity intended to connect more families with the United States Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Summer Food Service Program all year long. Participating branches connected children, teens, and families with resources to locally-sourced and sustainable food options. Activities included hands-on food and agricultural education such as gardening and cooking along with STEM, coding and financial literacy programs, and visits from notable children's authors. To further connect families with nutritious food and educational resources, Lunch at the Library programming participants each received a set of seven popular, age-appropriate books to start their own home library collection

Impact

- Increased branch visits growth rate 44% in June/July 2024 versus June/July 2023 (115,280 to 166,319)
- Increased total programs growth rate 39% in June/July 2024 versus June/July 2023(688 to 930)
- Increased programs attendance growth rate 48% in June/July 2024 versus June/July 2023 (18,635 to 27,492)
- Increased circulation growth rate 86% in June/July 2024 versus June/July 2023 (162,796 to 303,465)
- Distributed 20.000 books for families to build home libraries
- Provided \$19,000 in scholarships for LATL teen volunteers to learn career skills and assist during LATL
- Marketing-over 18,000,000 in impressions through radio, digital, billboard, movie theater and interview marketing innovation grant
- Served 14,613 meals to children during the summer
- Grew from 9 branches in 2022 to 13 branches in 2023 to 15 branches in 2024
- Increased families visiting from 414 families to 1020 families as determined by surveys
- Increased grant award letter from \$27,780 in 2022 to \$131,882 in 2023 to \$494,843 in 2024

Learning Session Information

We had 15 different types of learning opportunities. Program offerings above.

Our learners had a total of **572** learning sessions with their volunteer tutor or literacy staff person.

Our learners spent 1,548 1,548 hours learning with their volunteer tutor or literacy staff person.

Learner Information

We had a total of 27 COHS students, 11 students graduated with a diploma and career certificate. 17 learners returned to our adult literacy program and 73 new learners enrolled.

80

Our learners met 80 goals during this year, such as getting a job, accessing community resources, and sharing a book with a family member!

Families received a total of 823 books and educational materials to build their home learning environments.

Volunteer Information

We had a total of 48 volunteer tutors conducting either oneon-one or small group sessions

Our tutors spent **399** hours preparing for their learning sessions with their learners.


